This fall, you'll vote for Mayor and City Council using Ranked Choice Voting (RCV). There is no primary; RCV folds two elections into one, so you only have to make one trip to the polls.

MORE CHOICE. MORE POWER.

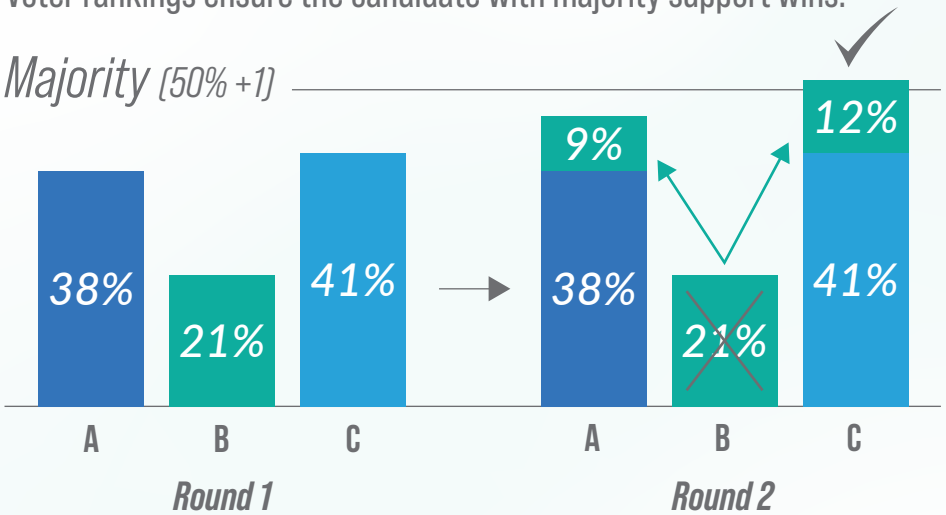
HOW YOU VOTE

- 1 Rank the candidates in order of preference on the ballot — 1st, 2nd, 3rd. The more you rank, the more power your ballot has.
- 2 Your second and third choices matter! But they will only be counted if your first choice is eliminated.
- 3 Do not mark the same candidate twice. Do not mark more than one candidate in any column.

HOW YOUR VOTE COUNTS

Voter rankings ensure the candidate with majority support wins.

Majority (50% +1)



No candidate earns a majority of 1st-choice votes, meaning a second round of counting is necessary.

Candidate B has the fewest 1st-choice votes and is eliminated. These ballots instantly transfer to those voters' 2nd choices. Candidate C wins!
